# 2022 Diley Ridge Medical Center Community Health Needs Assessment: An Overview of Health Fairfield County Community Health Needs Survey Results

Primary qualitative data was collected from Fairfield County adult residents between February 14, 2022 – March 7, 2022, to gather their thoughts of their community and the health needs of Fairfield County residents. Posters in the lobby and waiting rooms of Diley Ridge Medical Center invited adult patients residing in Fairfield County to take part in the survey by scanning a QR code. The same invitation was extended Fairfield County adult residents on Diley Ridge's website, Facebook page, as well as emails to patients and colleagues.


