Medic Minute is Back!

COVID is now endemic and we have adapted to the disease. We learned from our experiences over the past 3 years. I would like to reflect on lessons learned during the pandemic.

Looking back:

- COVID came out of nowhere and we were caught unprepared.
 EMS stepped up, adjusted work practices and continued to provide high-quality pre-hospital care.
- We adjusted our patient care practices to remain safe, protecting ourselves, our patients as well as the patients and staff of the receiving emergency departments. Many of these practices continue today.
- EMS and emergency departments were frontline providers and always available to our patients.
- The central Ohio EMS and healthcare systems collaborated in ways I have not seen in my 30+ years as an EMS physician.
 For example, the Franklin County healthcare systems jointly established the COVID unit at the Columbus Convention Center.
- Central Ohio EMS medical directors collaborated on our treatment and transport plans, collectively providing guidance to our EMS agencies. In addition, we developed a collaborative agreement among agencies to provide medical oversight should a medical director become incapacitated.
- EMS physicians, out of necessity, served as a key resource to EMS administration in adapting to the pandemic.
- Telehealth went from relative obscurity to mainstream. It's time to move it into our pre-hospital practice.
- The COVID pandemic prompted many to exit healthcare as a profession resulting in staffing shortages in all areas of healthcare.

Currently, COVID is not a significant burden for healthcare providers. But,

- RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) infections in children are at a
 high level across the country burdening pediatricians, pediatric
 emergency departments and urgent care centers. For most of
 us, RSV is an inconvenience but not a threat. In young children
 RSV may result in bronchiolitis and pneumonia requiring
 prolonged emergency department stays or hospital admission.
- Influenza season is coming. The experts are predicting a surge in influenza this year. You can reduce your risk of influenza by being vaccinated.
- Our healthcare systems in concert with EMS administration should pre-plan and identify alternative treatment locations for unscheduled visits by low acuity EMS patients during times of high ED volumes or during another infectious disease outbreak. We should consider implementation of 911 call center triage of low acuity calls with caller referral to a nurse call (or similar) line for patient linkage with community health services.

We should remember lessons learned from COVID. We must continue to collaborate in our response to other infectious disease outbreaks whether a new strain of COVID, RSV, influenza or other infectious diseases.


